


Words of the Week

HAWK CLASS LEARNING

Literacy

In literacy, we have just finished our unit writing a monologue for a character from our guided reading text, Lord of the Flies. We reacted to events from the book from the perspective of our chosen characters: the leader Ralph, the savage Jack or the intellectual Piggy. Next, we will be writing instructional texts linked to our geography topic and guided reading text- 'How to survive on a desert island.'

Science

This half term, our science unit is electricity. This week, we had our first lesson recapping on our prior knowledge and exploring questions about circuits by using the computer programme PhET circuits. The children had to answer these questions: Can you use various components to make your bulb light up? How can I make my bulb brighter? What happens if I add too many components to my circuit? Can you create a switch for you circuit? It was great to see them coming to their own conclusions through their own investigating.







Junior Citizen Trip

On Thursday, we went to Epsom racecourse to participate in the Junior citizen event for year 6 pupils. The event consists of various workshops run by the police, RNLI, Hope UK charity, ambulance service and more. These presentations and workshops deliver important information to the children on safety- the children learnt CPR, rail safety and the dangers of electricity. They also gained information on how to live a healthy lifestyle and the importance of becoming bright leaders who make positive choices.

Safer Internet Day 2023

During the week of last term, children in school celebrated Safer Internet Day with the theme: Want to talk about it? Children in KS1 listened to the story, 'Hanni and the Magic Window'. Hanni has a magic window at home (the internet) but when she sees something that upsets her, she struggles to explain what has happened. We talked about what she might have seen and what we should do if we



see something on the internet that upsets or worries us. We also carried out our online survey. These were some of the findings:

If we needed help with something online we would speak to either: daddy, mummy, brother, sister, granny, grandad or our teachers. These are tips we would give to people about being online:

- Limit your time going online.
- Talk to a grown up if you see something that worries you.
- Don't share your password with anyone.
- Don't watch your iPad in bed.

We like to do lots of things online: watch cute videos of funny puppies and other videos, play games, listen to music and look at pictures.

Children in Year 5 and 6 completed 'The Right to Privacy Quiz'. Working with a partner, children had to answer questions with either yes or no and then explain their response.

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Below are some steps you can take to help keep your child safer online:

- Parental controls: parental controls have been designed to help you manage your child's online activities. There are various types, some of which are free but others which can be bought.
 However, nothing is totally full proof so they shouldn't replace the need for you to support and advise your child using the internet. - **Supervise online activity:** keep the devices your child uses in communal areas of the house such as the living room or kitchen, where an adult is able to supervise. Primary-age children should not access the internet in private spaces alone, such as in bedroom or bathroom.
- Explore together and chat little and often: ask your child to show you their favourite apps, games and sites and encourage them to teach you how to use these. Ask them in anything ever worries them online. Make sure they know they won't be in trouble and can get help by talking to you or another adult they trust if anything happens online that makes them feel worries, sad or scared.
- Make sure they know where to go for support: remind your child they can always speak to you or an adult they trust if anything happens online that makes them feel worries or upset.
