

Muslims do sujud which is the most important part of Prayer for Muslims. They bow down and show respect. They repeat. They stand up and praise god. They've finished one rak'ah.

To start the rak'ah the person must say why they're praying (Niyah). This means it's got a purpose and is not just a routine. The person then raises their hands to the ears, saying, "God is great."

On the last rak'ah of prayer Muslims stay on their knees and say the Dua. Then turn their heads left and right to wish peace to those around and to the angels that the Muslims believe in. Then, they fold their arms and say the first surah of the Qur'an in Arabic. They praise Allah and ask him to keep Muslims on the 'straight path'. Muslims then say other parts of the Qur'an which are chosen by Imam.

The person who is praying bows to show respect. They stand up and praise Allah.


Shahadah (Faith)

- Declaration of belief




Salah (Prayer)

Sawm (Fasting)

- fasting happens in Ramadan between sunrise and sunset
- it isn't all about not eating and drinking but also about getting closer to Allah



Zakah (Almsgiving)

- giving money to charity
- important in Islam
- 21. and a half of savings to needy people
